She was a member facilitator for the Coalition of Black Trade Unionists, a Vice-President of the Canadian Labour of Congress, a national negotiator for the Public Service Alliance of Canada, and a member of the Women's Committee of the Ontario Federation of Labour. Carol's resilience and determination serve as a beacon, inspiring us to persist in the ongoing fight for equity and justice with education. Her most recent work was with CUPE Women in Leadership Development (WILD), a program for Black, racialized, and Indigenous women, to create radical change to address systemic racism.
